The Ambulance Department currently provides the following on a regular basis

- Provide 24/7 coverage that consist of having at least a two person crew being available for calls. This means that the EMTs hired as full time employees, that there is a crew available to respond.
- To be able to respond to calls for added calls while the primary crew is busy on other calls.
- Patient Care and/or transport during times of crises. This may be from accidents, illnesses, assaults or whatever event that occurred that caused them or their friends or family to request services.
- Patient Care for "WALK-INS" when the patient come to the public safety building to either seek care or advise, the on-duty crew will assist them. A lot of these calls do not require transportation and could be simply changing a bandage, check a blood pressure, or simply provide them to access outside agencies to provide them with appropriate medical advice.
- Respond to patients homes when they may need assistance with their home medical equipment, such as their home oxygen, their medic alert system, provide them with portable oxygen tanks or other items that the department may have to assist them in a unique process.
- Provide Transportation from medical facilities in outlying health care facilities to the patient's home because they're unable to ride in a conventional means of transportation and the public transportation is unavailable. This may also occur when those patients are returning home under HOSPICE Care.
- Ambulance Crews have assisted families when dealing in End of Life Care situations by providing temporary use of equipment such as Pulse Oxygenation Devices, Thermometers, and other equipment that they may not have readily available when that patient has returned home from another healthcare facility.
- Crews have responded to assist individuals who have fallen and they simply cannot get back up, yet are not injured.
- Providing services at local events such as Annual Pow Wow, Poker Run, Fourth of July Fireworks events, horse races or other community events that may occur throughout the year.

- Have responded to many calls for assistance to both Stevens and Lincoln Counties for transport assistance because the local service is busy on other calls or responding to the calls when our services are closer.
- On rare occasion provide bandages or other first aid supplies because they couldn't get them at the store or clinic due to being closed.
- Have provided representation for many years to the Head Start program during their safety parade event generally held in early fall season.
- Program has assisted community residents during weather events, during fire events, during power outages and other wide spread emergencies. This assistance has included delivery of water, heaters, and fire logs to some when the power has been out to ensure they're warm. The individuals generally are those that don't get out of the home, have limited outside resources, have very limited communication equipment, etc...
- Crews in the past have prepared, served and in some cases delivered Holiday meals to the elders stuck in home or provided them a seat at the table at the public safety building for those that were less fortunate.
- Ambulance Crews have provided services during sporting events at the Wellpinit School, provided blood pressure stations during housing fairs, during community days (years past) or set up informational booths during career days at the High School, and even set up information booths at the Native American events that were conducted in Spokane County.
- Participated in water rescue/recovery events that ultimately ended up being tragic events.
- Provide CPR/First Aid training to the various Tribal Employees that require the training throughout their employment.



FIRE DEPARTMENT

- Fire Department generally responds to all structure fires that occur within the boundaries of the reservation.
- Respond to all vehicle fires as well as wildland fires during the off season of the year when Fire Management are not in service.
- Respond to assist Fire Management in dealing with Wildland Fires, especially in areas where homes or other property is threatened.
- Participate in Head Start safety parade.
- Assist the Ambulance Department as needed when responding to vehicle accidents and patients may need to be extricated from the vehicle.
- Have responded to assist tribal programs that had flooding issues.
- Participate in community events such as Pow Wow, firework events.
- Stand-by for outlying agencies on major fire events that also pose a threat to the local residents of the reservation.
- Assisting in search and rescue events when situations warrants.



Spokane Tribal Police (509) 258-4569

The resources provided by the Spokane Tribal Police Department include, but are not limited to the following:

- Engage in law enforcement patrols throughout the Spokane Indian Reservation, to include foot patrols and physically checking the doors and windows of Tribally owned buildings to their security.
- Effect arrests, forcibly if necessary, of suspects of crimes.
- Prepare investigative and other reports.
- Gather information in criminal investigations by interviewing and obtaining the statements of victims, witnesses, suspects, and confidential informants.
- Pursue fleeing suspects and perform rescue operations which may involve quickly entering and exiting law enforcement patrol vehicle; lifting, caring, and dragging heavy objects; jumping down from elevated surfaces; climbing through openings; jumping over obstacles, ditches, and streams; crawling in confined areas; balancing on uneven or narrow surfaces; and using body force to gain entrance through barriers.
- Conduct visual and audio surveillance for extended periods of time.
- Effectively communicate with people, including juveniles and the elderly, by giving information and directions, mediating disputes and advising of rights and processes.
- Detect and collect evidence and substances that provide the basis of criminal offenses and infractions which indicate the presence of dangerous conditions.
- Perform rescue functions at accidents, emergencies and disasters to include directing traffic for long periods of time, administering emergency medical aid, lifting, dragging, and carrying people from particular areas.
- Process and transport prisoners and committed mental patients using appropriate restraints, if necessary.
- Assist Fire/EMS in the suppression of both structural and wildland fires.

- Available to support community functions such as Truck or Treat, Spokane Tribal Head Start, etc.
- The Spokane Tribal Police is available to serve court documents.

The David C. Wynecoop Memorial Clinic (DCWMC) is dedicated to the memory of David C. Wynecoop, Sr. Mr. Wynecoop was a member of the

Spokane Tribe of Indians and he served as Service Unit Director until 1985. Mr. Wynecoop had a very significant effect upon the health and welfare of the people of the Kalispel and Spokane Tribes.

The DCWMC consists of one ambulatory care health center at Wellpinit, Washington. The DCWMC primarily serves the ambulatory needs of the Spokane Tribe. The DCWMC is staffed with 30 employees including 1 Physician, 2 Family Nurse Practitioners, 1 Registered Nurse, 3 Medical Assistants, 1 Dentist, 2 Dental Assistants, 1 Medical Technologist, 2 Pharmacists, 1 Pharmacy Technician, 1 X-ray Technician, 1 Public Health Nurse and other support staff. Services include medical and dental, in house Pharmacy for patients of the DCWMC. DCWMC offers a number of specialty clinics. Our specialty clinics include Podiatry, Women's Health, Diabetes Care and expanding to others in the future. In FY 2016 approximately 24,000 outpatient visits were made to the DCWMC. The total active patients served at the DCWMC is near 2,800.

The DCWMC was built in 1970 and in 2001 the Indian Health Service and the Spokane Tribe of Indians completed a collaborative construction project of a new ambulatory primary health care addition to the DCWMC. The clinic expansion more than doubled the available facility space.

Fire Wood Assistance - for 2 weeks every fall DNR staff go out and cut firewood for seniors. We work with LIHEAP and Elders Program to identify those most in need of assistance. Because of issues we have experienced the last two years. We have a group that is now "drafting" a policy to guide whom and how we assist in the future.

Salmon Distribution - every spring, the salmon hatcheries contact us to receive surplus salmon. Numbers we receive always depend on returns. We send DNR staff to these hatcheries to gather them. DNR tries to fill the freezers each run with 100 fish for cultural and ceremonial purposes. Then the remaining are distributed to Tribal Members at three locations -West-End, Wellpinit, Ford, TANF sends a crew to distribute salmon in Spokane for Tribal Members there.

Subcontracts will be awarded through a Forestry Work Contract and will adhere to the Spokane Indian Reservation Forest Work Contract Policy and Procedures document, passed via STOI Resolution 2008-343. Providing Forestry Work Contracts to the local public will provide economic and employment opportunities while meeting goals of wildland fire risk reduction of the Fuels Management program.

Tribal Fisheries & Hatchery

Each year Spokane Tribal Fisheries partners with local organizations and schools in an effort to assist local educators with outreach materials and programs. One such program is through the Lake Roosevelt Forum which offers Student Discovery Week. This exciting event is an exceptional opportunity for middle school students and teachers to explore the ecological, social and economic complexities of Lake Roosevelt's watershed. Each Discovery Zone is staffed by local resource specialists, including biologists, geologists and foresters representing many different agencies.

Recently we began developing a Salmon in the Classroom project to assist Spokane Tribal students with understanding the cultural, historical and Ecological importance that Salmon has to the Spokane Tribe of Indians. The project will be online starting this fall and is highlighted by a painted mural and dugout canoe carved by tribal members.

Student Internships are also available as each year the Spokane Tribal Fisheries department hosts several student interns who are in their Junior or Senior year of High school or recently started college. Typically, the student interns participate in the Spokane Tribal Program or are selected from external internship programs such as the American Fisheries Society Hutton Junior Fisheries Biologist Program. Students have the opportunity to work on several projects within the Spokane Tribal Fisheries program including Limnology, Lake Roosevelt Fisheries, and Sturgeon Recovery. Student Interns need to be able to provide their own transportation to mentor's office in Wellpinit, WA. Or Airway Heights, WA with each assignment involving extensive field work ranging from 7-10 hours per day. Through this program, students have the opportunity to engage with:

- Resident Fisheries: Conducting fish surveys throughout the mainstream Columbia River from Grand Coulee Dam to Evans Landing as well as the Spokane and Sanpoil Arms.
- Anadromous Fisheries: The program is preparing tribal waters for, and furthering policy towards, reintroducing anadromous species to the blocked are of the Columbia River upstream of Chief Joseph and Grand Coulee Dams.
- Limnology: Students will be assigned to work with a team of limnologists to conduct field work that will include evaluation of hydro-operation and hatchery effects on the lower tropic levels, water quality and other limnological parameters of Lake Roosevelt.
- White Sturgeon Recovery: Students will have the opportunity to work with an international team of sturgeon biologists to continue project sampling which includes sub-yearling (juvenile) assessment monitoring, adult stock assessment monitoring, and telemetry monitoring.

The Spokane Tribal Hatchery was constructed by the U.S. Department of Energy Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) in 19990 as partial mitigation for damages caused by the Federal Columbia River Hydroelectric Project. Operation and maintenance of the hatchery is funded by BPA and the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

The objective of the hatchery program is to produce rainbow trout for recreational/sport and Tribal subsistence fisheries in Lake Roosevelt as well as inland reservation lakes. To meet this objective, the hatchery annually releases:

- 2,000 rainbow trout adults below Little Falls Dam, April-June
- 3,000 rainbow trout adults in Reservation Lakes, April-June
- 40,000 rainbow trout yearlings below Little Falls Dam, April-June
- 250,000 rainbow trout juveniles in Spokane Arm, July-September.

The hatchery also produces 360,000 rainbow trout juveniles for transfer to Lake Roosevelt net pen operations.

The hatchery also supports the Tribes Fisheries and Water Resources Division by rearing native Redband Trout, Upper Columbia White Sturgeon and Columbia River Chinook Salmon.

The hatchery operates 7 days of week, pending COVID pandemic restrictions is open to visitation Monday – Friday 8 am to 3 pm. Tours by appointment only.

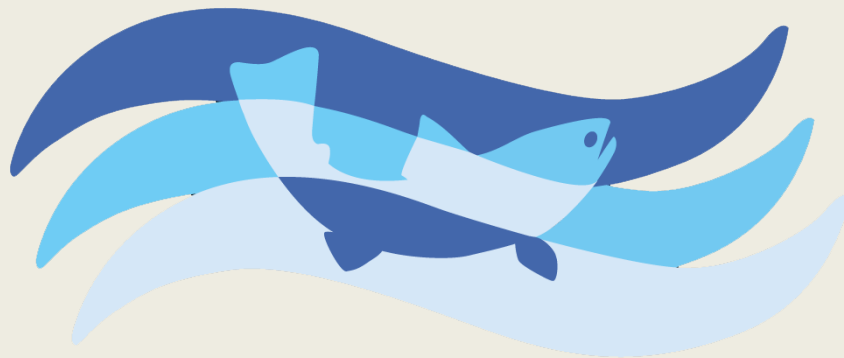

The Water and Fish Program conducts monthly water sampling on all community water systems including the Wellpinit School and Chewelah Casino. For information on water quality contact Nicklas Eldred 626-4406

Our Program has also conducted individual well testing across the Reservation and can assist residents with water quality questions. We can sample drinking water and deliver samples to the Tribal (T-Creek Labs) water quality laboratory however the cost to run the sample is not covered due to budget constraints. This program is also involved in the Midnite Mine clean-up as well as the Dawn Mill clean-up and are available to answer technical questions about the two efforts. The Spokane Tribe Air Quality Departments offers a few Indoor Air Quality services. These include:

Radon Levels – Radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer behind smoking. You cannot see, smell or taste radon, you must test for it. All homes in northern Washington have radon with a higher percentage of homes possibly having high levels (the higher the levels equate to smoking more cigarettes in a day as a comparison)

The Air Quality Program also offers to do walk throughs to assess for indoor air quality problems and have an example kit from Tribal Healthy Homes Network (THHN), with the goal of keeping indoor air quality at good levels.

The Spokane Tribe Fire Prevention Program identifies wildfire prevention priority areas, actions, and responsibilities consistent with the Spokane Reservation land management planning goals. The use of appropriate fire personnel and resources, the education and application of personnel and resources and the documentation for additional resources through the Fire Prevention/Fire Management Plan.

The main goals and objectives of the Fire Prevention Program are:

- To reduce unwanted human caused ignitions by ten (10%) percent within the boundaries of the Spokane Indian Reservation over the next ten years to improve firefighter and public safety.
- Actions taken to fulfill this objective include but not limited to: closures/restrictions, patrolling, signing, media, etc.
- Ensure firefighter and public safety as first priority
- Education on wildfires
- Reduce risk of major wildfires with fuels treatments
- Reduce land lost due to a major wildfire.

The Fire Prevention Program enforces safety considerations within the community through communication to the general public regarding:

- Current fire danger
- Fire weather (red flag warnings)
- Fire information to protect your land and home
- Reduction in threat to community through fuels reduction activities such as:
 - Mowing brush
 - Tree thinning
 - Removal of fuels
 - Escape plans in the event of a wildfire, defensible space around homes
- Investigations of wildfire starts to locate the origin and cause
 - Track arson fires

- Collaboration and cooperation with local law enforcement
- Wildfire Education
 - Camp fire safety
 - Smokey Bear programs/events
 - Equipment Use
 - Firework safety
 - School programs
 - Youth Programs
- Issue Burn Permits
- Community assessments throughout the reservation



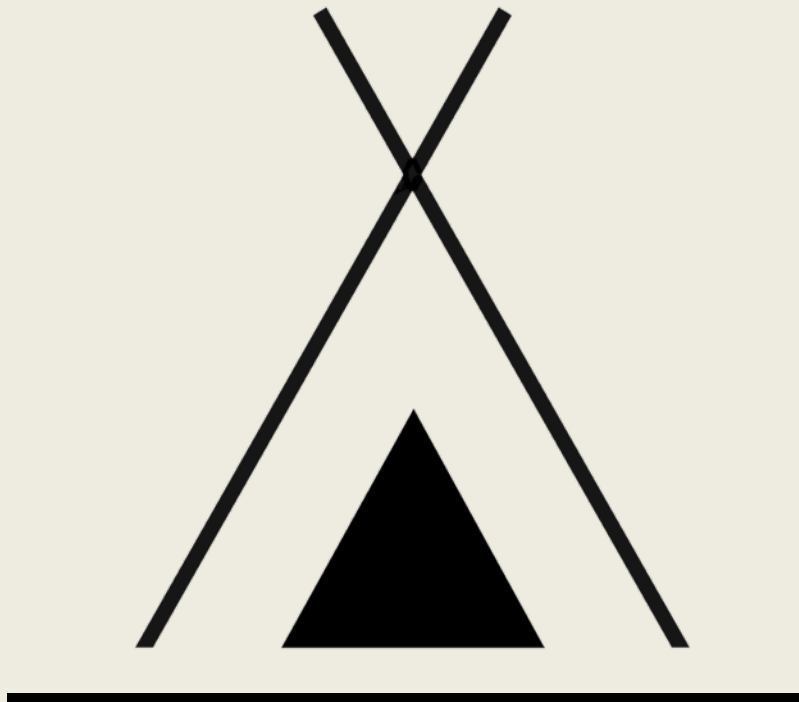

Are you or someone you know in need of food assistance? The Food Distribution Program (FDP) can help. We are currently taking applications for the Food Distribution Program. How do I qualify? Anyone living on the reservation and is not on Food Stamps and fits within the income guidelines are eligible. Anyone living off the reservation must live within Lincoln, Stevens and Pend Oreille counties and be a member of a federally recognized Tribe. We also have an emergency food bank and emergency food voucher (\$65 to be used at the Trading Post). Documents needed when applying are income statements of all income coming into the household, light bill showing residency, Social Security numbers of all members living in the household and no one in the household can be on Food Stamps. New guidelines have been added to the program, so stop by and see if you qualify.

We will accomplish this by utilizing teamwork, developing and maintaining trust, ensuring confidentiality and accountability on a personable and professional level.

The STOI Behavioral Health program has mental health providers that provide an array of treatment/counseling for diverse mental health disorders.

Vocational Rehabilitation Program

The mission of the Spokane Tribe Vocational Rehabilitation Program (STVR) is to provide culturally appropriate Vocational Rehabilitative services to Native Americans with disabilities who have a functional limitation and need assistance maintaining, obtaining, or regaining employment. If you're disabled and you want to work, you may be eligible for our program.

Eligibility requirements include the following:

- Must be a member of a U.S. federally recognized Native American tribe
Must live in Lincoln, Pend Oreille, Spokane or Stevens county.
- Must have a verifiable disability that makes it difficult to get or keep a job.

Spokane Tribe Emergency Assistance Program Policies and Procedures

The Spokane Tribe of Indians has established an Emergency Assistance Program (EAP) for Spokane Tribal Members who are experiencing financial hardships due to an unexpected emergency situation. The program is operated by the Health and Human Services program and governed by Social Services Program Manager and/or HHS Assistant Director. It is the programs intent to assist tribal members in their time of need as funding permits.

To be eligible for the program, the following will apply:

- A household applying for assistance must have at least one enrolled member of the Spokane Tribe and services must directly benefit the enrolled member and/or their immediate family members.
- Applicant must provide written proof of emergency (notification from health care provider, appointment slips, fire reports, unpaid or past due bills, verification of extended hospitalization, etc....)
- Applicant must apply for, be denied or have exhausted all other services from other programs such as TANF, DSHS, Indian Health and Private Insurance, etc....
- All Requests must be submitted in writing or through the EAP application.
- Eligibility for services will be determined by the HHS Assistant Director and HHS Designee.
- Assistance is not intended to cover 100% of costs and will have limitations.

What is considered an Emergency Situation?

Emergency situations include unexpected life occurrences that tribal members cannot always plan for that affect the immediate health, safety and medical needs of a tribal member.

Those situations include but are not limited to:

Medical Emergencies
Behavioral/Mental Health Needs
House Fire
Elderly/Disabled Home Health & Safety
Utility Shut-off/Eviction/Vehicle Repair
Emergency Travel/Funeral
Other Hardships

ASSISTANCE CATEGORIES

I MEDICAL EMERGENCY:

Emergency medical assistance will be approved for Priority 1 or 2 Urgent Care emergencies which is defined as diagnostic or therapeutic services that are necessary to prevent immediate death or serious impairment of the health of the individual. Diagnosis and treatment of injuries or medical conditions that if left untreated, would result in uncertain but potentially grave outcomes.

This may include the following illnesses:

- CHRONIC medical emergency is an illness/disease that is long-lasting or recurrent. Affects physical, emotional, and intellectual functioning. (Examples: Diabetes, heart disease, cancer, lupus, fibromyalgia, arthritis, chronic pain, stroke, dialysis, physical therapy, etc.) Applicant must provide schedule of appointments for travel and assistance is based on treatment plan.
- LIFE THREATENING medical emergency. To be eligible for this service an individual must meet the criteria and their immediate family member must be hospitalized for at least two days/48 hours. Applicant(s) must provide documentation from hospital stating hospitalization.
- CRITICAL AND/OR TERMINAL illness of an immediate family member that requires admittance to an intensive/critical care unit at a hospital. Must provide verification.
- BEHAVIORAL/MENTAL HEALTH emergency is an identified, emergent situation in which an individual is a danger to himself and/or others and is in immediate need of an assessment and treatment. Verification is required from a behavioral health counselor that the individual is seeking treatment and is not eligible for any other program assistance (example: HHS Behavioral Health)

Hospitalization: If your household is currently experiencing a medical emergency that fits the above criteria and resulted in hospitalization for at least two days/48 hours, applicant may be eligible for up to \$200 (\$50 per day) for travel of 70 miles or more to assist with the cost of gas, lodging and meal expenses. For example, if member is hospitalized for more than 1 week, program may assist family @ \$200 per week. Note Assistance is not intended to cover 100% of costs.

Applicants must not be the person hospitalized but be either a spouse/significant other, parent, dependent child or other immediate household member responsible for the care of the hospitalized individual. Verification of hospital stay is required. Note Assistance is not intended to cover 100% of costs.

Follow-up appointments/After Care/Priority One appointments: An Individual who is suffering from a long-lasting/recurrent chronic illness, was recently hospitalized for a medical emergency or has an identified behavioral health issue may be eligible for the following based on verification of follow-up appointments or after care:

- Wellpinit/Spokane: 80 miles @.20 per mile. \$16.00per day/\$10 per day/additional meal/parking for a total of \$26.00 per day
- Ford/Spokane: 70 miles @.20 per mile. \$14.00 per day/\$10.00 for meal/parking for a total of \$24.00 per day.
- West End/Spokane: 130 miles @.20 per mile. \$26.00/per trip/\$10.00 for meals/parking for a total of \$36.00 per day.

II FIRE

If a fire has destroyed or caused extensive damage to a Tribal Member's residence and contents, they may be eligible for assistance. The applicant must submit a copy of the fire report from the Fire Department. The fire policy is set by Spokane Resolution 1944-162, as amended by Spokane Resolution 1998-204. Allowance is \$1000.00 per household fire; and \$200.00 per Tribal member who maintains a permanent residence in the home. If the fire loss is covered by homeowner's insurance then only the deductible amount will be paid up to a maximum of \$1,000.

III ELDERLY AND DISABLED HOME HEALTH AND SAFETY ASSISTANCE

This program was created to provide emergency assistance to Spokane Tribal Elders (age 60 & over) and disabled individuals to eliminate health and safety hazards, and to improve handicapped accessibility in their homes. This may include but is not limited to assistance with the cost of plumbing/well repairs, HVAC repairs, appliances, hot water tanks, electrical repairs, and handicap access/fixtures/ramps. Assistance provided under this program is limited to a maximum amount of \$500.00 per fiscal year and it must directly benefit the Spokane Tribal elder/disabled individual.

IV UTILITY SHUT-OFF/EVICTION NOTICES/VEHICLE REPAIR

Tribal members who are experiencing a medical emergency which has resulted in limited household funds may also be eligible for assistance with utility shut-off notices, housing eviction notices and vehicle repairs. To qualify for this category the tribal member must be able to identify and provide proof of a stop in work, decrease in wages or temporary leave of absence due to a medical emergency of self or an immediate family member. Elderly or disabled tribal members do not need to prove a financial burden, must only identify that assistance will ensure that their medical needs can be met. Assistance is limited to \$250 per fiscal year, per household.

V EMERGENCY/FUNERAL TRAVEL

Tribal members who have a relative experiencing a life-threatening emergency, end-of-life situation or death may be eligible for assistance for travel to be with loved ones or attend a funeral. The relative must be an immediate or extended family member (Mother, father, son, daughter, brother, sister, aunt, uncle or cousin). Assistance provided under this category is as follows and limited to \$250 per fiscal year, per household:

- Travel less than 50 miles round trip does not qualify for assistance.
- Travel 50+ miles round-trip @ 50% of approved IRS mileage rate.

VI HARDSHIP UNITS

The Spokane Tribal Forestry Program has in place a hardship program for Spokane Tribal members have faced the recent death of an immediate family member or have endured a medical emergency/hardship that has resulted in unpaid medical bills and are experiencing extraordinary financial hardships. The following is a list of hardships:

- Assistance with unpaid funeral costs for death of a family member that you are financially responsible for. Assistance will not be provided for costs of memorials or headstones.
- Extended hospitalization of an immediate family member for (5 days or longer).
- House fire which puts the family out of the home and there is no insurance.
- Assistance for Tribal Families that may be experiencing extraordinary hardships – all requests are determined on case by case basis and if proper documentation and application is received by HHS.

Approved unit amounts are strictly based on the family needs presented through documentation. Forestry staff will prioritize all hardship approvals for setup, administration, inspections and invoicing for payments to the tribal accounting department.

All applications for hardship units must include copies of unpaid/past-due bills, verification of extended hospitalization of immediate family member and any other documentation as requested by Social Service staff.

APPLICATION PROCESS

- 1) Completed application is to be submitted to the Social Services Program Manager and/or HHS Assistant Director (This requirement may be waived by the Social Services Program Manager and/or HHS Assistant Director for the death of an immediate family member upon verification with Tribal Enrollment Officer)
- 2) In addition to the application the following documentation pertaining to the emergency must be submitted:
 - **For Hospitalization:** Must provide written verification that immediate family member was hospitalized for a chronic, life threatening, critical/terminal or behavioral health emergency for at least 2 days (48 hours).
 - **For Follow –Up Appointments/Aftercare:** Must provide written verification/schedule of appointments
 - **For a Fire:** Must submit a copy of the fire report.
 - **For Elder Assistance:** Must submit a quote or estimate from a contractor/vendor. Payment will be issued to the contractor/vendor upon completion of the work.
- 3) If requesting assistance for upcoming medical appointments please submit your application no less than 3 days prior to appointment. Untimely or incomplete requests may result in delayed assistance.

REVIEW PROCESS

After all required documentation is received from the applicant the Social Services Program Manager and/or HHS Assistant Director will review. Social Services Program Manager and/or HHS Assistant Director will contact the applicant to inform them of the recommendation.

PAYMENTS

Checks will be made available as soon as possible after all documentation has been provided and application has been approved. Social Services Program Manager and/or HHS Assistant Director will contact the applicant when the check is available. Checks not picked up within two weeks of issue date will be cancelled/voided. Payment guidelines are as follows:

- Payments related to medical or fire assistance will be issued directly to the approved applicant. (Example: Payment made directly to applicant for meal/travel to scheduled appointment)
- Payments for elder/disabled assistance will be issued directly to the contractor/vendor after completion of work order. (Example: Payment made directly to tribal public works department for pumped sewer)
- Payments for Hardship units or other life-occurring emergencies will be paid to a vendor whenever possible. (Example: Payment made directly to Avista Utilities for electricity shut-off notice)
- Hardship unit funds will not be distributed unless the thinning unit has been approved by inspection for partial or final payment and signed by designated representative.
- Hardship Units will be completed within six months from date contract signed or contract will be forfeited.
- Applicants receiving Hardship Unit assistance will not be issued a 1099 miscellaneous income form and will not have to report this to the IRS or other agencies as taxable income.

GREIVANCE

Decisions made by Social Services Program Manager and/or HHS Assistant Director are final and based on the application and documentation submitted. The Social Services Program Manager and/or HHS Assistant Director may revisit a request if additional supporting documentation was provided that meets eligibility criteria stated in this policy.

Eligibility: Victim of violence within the past 2 months or current will receive first priority. (Domestic Violence is defined as a form of violence from their partner, significant other, spouse, and/or family member.)

Children of the Sun Head Start is comprehensive program designed to serve families with preschool children. Head Start provides opportunities for children to grow, discover, achieve and gain skills.

A child's preschool years are a time of rapid learning as well as emotional and physical development. We appreciate that parents share their children with us and we respect their role as first teachers.

This year we have added the Wrap Around Program for our working parents. Wrap Around drop off time starts as early as 6:30 am – 9:30 am and afternoon hours are: 2:00 pm – 5:00 pm.

Resources are developed per a family's individual needs based on their individual Family Partnership Plan Assessment and Family Goal Statement. These assessments can be different and varying in need every school year as all families are different including their needs and goals. Needs can include but are not limited to:

- job training,
- education,
- basic needs,
- transportation,
- special needs/mental health,
- health education,
- family finances, etc.

Services provided in general for Head Start families include:

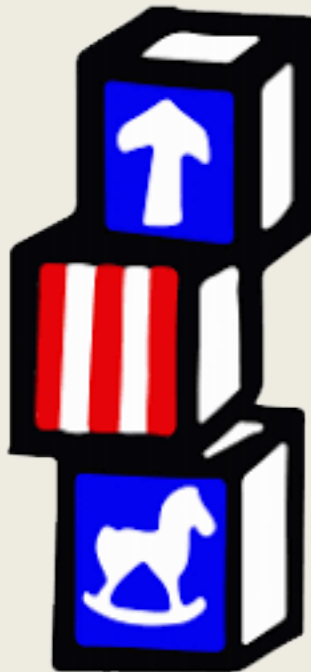
- Early Childhood Education for children ages 3-5 years old,

- Kindergarten Transitions for children 4-5 years old graduating from the Head Start.

Head Start provides resources for the child's total development which include but not limited to:

- health,
- nutrition,
- education,
- social services,
- special needs,
- parental involvement and many areas and events for family engagement opportunities.

Head Start collaborates with established community resources to serve our families through community partnerships including MOU's. If community resources are unavailable, additional out of area resource partnerships are developed to serve a family's needs or goals. Out of area resources are properly researched for efficiency and effective services before formal or informal referrals are submitted.





Spokane Indian Housing Authority (509) 818-1460

The Spokane Indian Housing Authority (SIHA) assist eligible applicants to find affordable housing on the Spokane Indian Reservation and service area.

COVID-19 Rental Assistance Program: 12 Spokane Tribal Members are receiving rental and mortgage assistance. SIHA received \$120,000 to assist low income Native Americans for up to 12 months during the COVID-19 pandemic. Funding must be expended no later than 9/30/2021.

US Treasury Temporary Rental and Utility Assistance: Housing recently received \$3.1 million from the US Treasury Department to assist low income rental tenants who have been directly or indirectly impacted by COVID-19. The program provides rental and utility assistance to eligible Native American families that are at or below 80% of the current NAHASDA Median Income level. 65% of the funding must be expended by 9/30/21. Current policy allows services to those residing in our service area.

Veterans Administration Supportive Housing (VASH) Program: Housing in conjunction with HUD and Veterans Administration is currently providing rental assistance to 20 Native American Veterans living in our service area. Funding for this program is provided from HUD and is a pilot program.

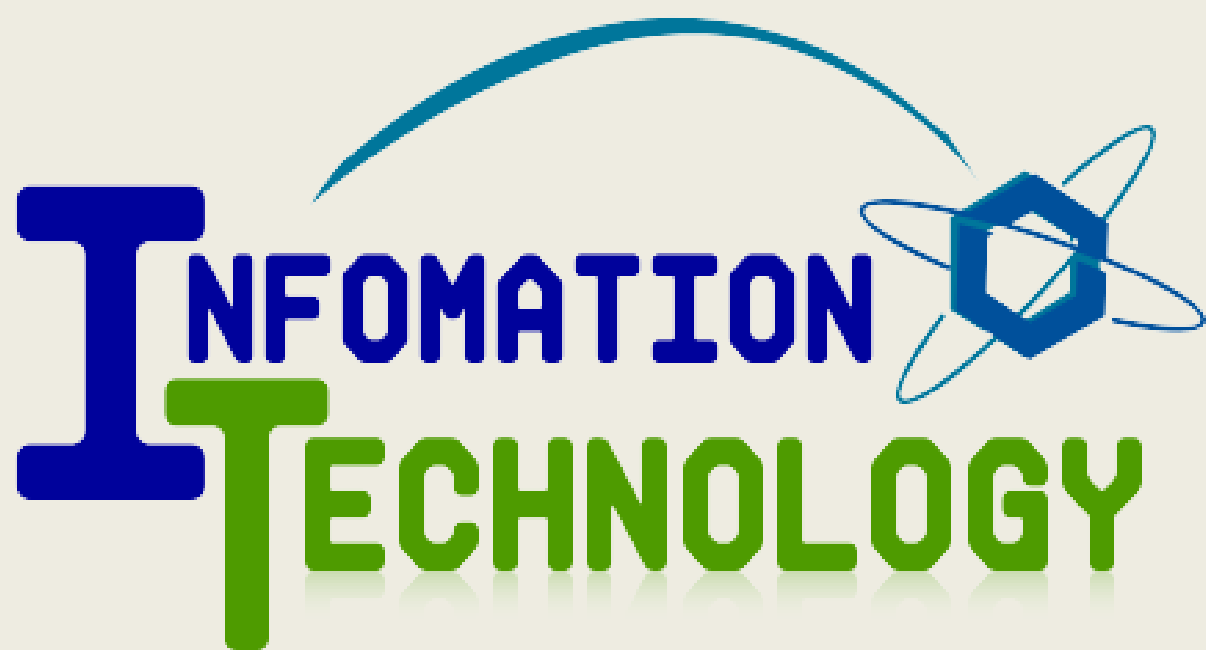
Home Improvement Loans: 4 loans are currently being managed by Housing. The Home Improvement Loan Program provides current and paid off home buyers a financial resource to make necessary improvements to their home. This program is restricted to the original home. The home improvement loan may supplement or replace the Equity Use Policy for improvements or other housing emergencies. Loans can vary from less than \$2,500 to \$25,000 of assistance to ensure a successful program for SIHA.

Equity Use: This policy provides guidance for SIHA and the homebuyer on the uses and restrictions on Mutual Help Equity Monthly Payment Accounts. The primary goal of the equity paid in by the Homebuyers is used for payoff of the home. MEPA funds can be requested on an emergency basis (such as range, refrigerator, heating stoves, exterior door locks, handicap conversion, plumbing

system repairs, electric evaluations/repairs, water system, septic or drain field issues. Please see Equity use policy for regulations and restrictions.

Down Payment Assistance: 40 grants have been processed since the inception of the program. One off reservation grant is in process and one pending application this fiscal year. The Board of Commissioners recently updated this policy to allow up to \$50,000 for first time homebuyers in our service area and \$20,000 for homebuyers that have previously been served by Housing. This program offered by the SIHA provides interest-free loans (down payment assistance), forgivable over a 10-year period, to assist homebuyers with the purchase or construction of a single-family home in standard condition, located on or to be located on the Spokane Indian Reservation.

Weatherization: (SIHA WX) program does diagnostic testing for health and safety to confirm the need for air sealing and prescribed insulating in attics and crawlspace floor joists, SIHA WX also installs whole house bath fans for health and indoor air quality along with energy conservation measures and educates single family home owners and renters to help keep energy bills to a minimum. This program is limited to low income only.

Text Alerts

The Spokane Tribe currently has a mass text system in place. This is used to get word out quickly to anyone who subscribes. This is very useful as not everyone uses email, social media, or actively checks the STOI webpage. Almost everyone these days does have a cell phone. To be added to the current distribution list by texting the keyword STOI to phone number 31996. You should receive a message shortly after letting you know you are signed up for text alerts from the Spokane Tribe. Message and data rates may apply.

Emails

The Spokane Tribe I.T. Department sends out informational mass email also, for anything from work announcements to community events. Most Tribal employment email addresses should receive these email blasts. We also have a community mass email list as well, for anyone who does not work for the Tribe but wants to stay in the loop on Tribal news, and community events. For a community member to be added to the list they only need to contact the I.T. Department. If someone with a Tribal email address is not receiving email blasts they only need to contact the I.T. Department to be added to the list.

Tribal Members Portal

The Spokane Tribe has added to their web page a news portal for Spokane Tribal Members who are 18 years or older. The content of this portal will contain information relating to the Spokane Tribe of Indians that is confidential and proprietary to the Spokane Tribe such as General Council information or special meetings and will only be available to the enrolled members of the Spokane Tribe.

Enrolled Spokane Tribal Members can request access to login by navigating to the web page <https://spokanetribe.com/login/> . A link to this page can also be found on the main STOI home page in the upper right corner where it says, “Tribal Member

Login.” When you fill out your request please DO NOT use your work e-mail address. Instead use your personal address.

When your request is submitted your enrollment status will be verified by the STOI Enrollment Officer. Shortly after you will receive two emails. One confirming you being added as a user, and the second to set your password. The email to set your password will come from Wordpress, keep an eye out for it. It might accidentally go to your junk mail folder. The second email will also have your username. Once your password is set you can log in to the portal to view news intended for the Spokane Tribal Membership.

Call-Center

The Spokane Tribe today launched the new Incident Command Center Page. This page will serve as a place for updates and news when there is a community emergency happening. People can receive notices when an update has been made to the page by scrolling to the bottom of the main Incident Command Page and subscribing. - Spokane Tribal TANF is a tribally operated program with sites in Wellpinit and Spokane. The TANF program provides assistance to needy families to become self-sufficient or reduce their dependency on government subsidies. Assistance can come in the form of cash assistance, job preparation, prevention and referrals.
- Supports Services: \$2,000 yearly for auto insurance, \$1,500 lifetime car repair, \$1,000 tire replacement, \$1,000 miscellaneous for family cases \$500 for child only

- TANF WEX/Stipend position with the 477 Program is a subsidized employment opportunity for 477 clients. These are temporary, training positions that allow clients to build and develop work skills and knowledge to promote future employment.
- WIOA WEX position with the 477 Program is a subsidized employment opportunity for anyone (do not have to be a cash assistance client) who meets program income guidelines and determined eligible with the 477 program. General Assistance clients fall under this position type.

- Sub Wage Phase I position with the 477 Program is a subsidized employment opportunity for TANF and General Assistance Clients. It is a temporary position and geared towards clients who have past job experience and skills that can be used in the workplace
- Sub Wage Phase II position is offered if a client completes a Sub Wage Phase I positions successfully and the employer wishes to extend the length of your position. This position can potentially move in to full-time employment depending on employer.

477 General Assistance

Wellpinit Schools

The Wellpinit School District is a rural K-12, public school district centered on the Spokane Indian Reservation in Eastern Washington. It is located in southwest Stevens County, approximately 45 miles from Spokane. We serve approximately 600 students in grades K-12. Wellpinit School District was chartered as a state and county school in 1913 and a large public school was built in 1938. The present school facility was built in 1987 with the current Elementary school grades located in the old school building that was renovated in 2003. In addition, the District serves students beyond the reservation boundaries through the Alliance Education Program. The Wellpinit School District has a staff of approximately 100 personnel.

Our local student population is approximately 95% Native American or descendent. The students residing in the district are primarily from the Spokane Tribe of Indians; in addition we also have students from the Colville Confederated Tribes, Nez Perce, Coeur d' Alene, Kalispell and other Tribes.

The district's recently remodeled building houses the Middle School (grades 6-8) and high school (grades 9-12). The elementary school is housed in a nicely remodeled building about a half mile from the middle school and high school building. The district also has a building that houses the district office. In addition, the district has an Open Doors Reengagement Program offering a high school diploma or GED. Reengagement Programs are located in Wellpinit, at Fort Simcoe Job Corps, and Moses Lake Columbia Job Corps. The district has a broad range of programs to serve the needs of its diverse student population.

Wellpinit School District also offers Open Doors Reengagement Academy. Due to a variety of reasons, many students often find themselves well into their high school career with few credits and an overwhelming feeling of failure and no chance at achieving a high school diploma. Wellpinit School District's Student Engagement Academy (SEA) is a new program designed to offer young adults, ages 16-21, who do not yet have a diploma or high school equivalency (GED) an alternative to dropping out of school. This program will allow students to work toward their high school diploma or study for the GED.

Students will have access to basic skills courses in Reading, Writing and Math as well as Special Education. At the High School level, students will be able to choose from a variety of options, including online credit and credit retrieval and GED prep. Students will complete a rigorous training program and earn industry-recognized credentials through their trade classes. They will participate in Career Readiness coursework with the option of Work Based Learning, where they will learn how to search for and retain a job. Each student will have a counselor and access to medical care, mental health care and drug and alcohol counseling.

Student Engagement Academy will seek to provide students with a plan to meet their academic goals while they are enrolled in the program. Students will receive high school credit for all academic work completed and are not required to take only the courses they need to complete in order to graduate. A student may choose to earn a GED or a High School Diploma.

Wellpinit School District operates 3 Reengagement Academies located in; Moses Lake @ Columbia Basin Job Corps, White Swan @ Fort Simcoe Job Corps and Wellpinit @ Wellpinit S.D.

The Reengagement Academies are part of OSPI Open Doors Youth Reengagement. A dropout reengagement system that provides education and services to older youth, ages 16-21, who have dropped out of school or are not expected to graduate from high school by the age of 21.

Open Doors re-engage disconnected youth through programs that:

- Encourage community partnerships
- Create multiple pathways for students to realize success
- Provide an on-ramp to post-secondary achievement through a performance based, individualized support model.
