SPOKANE TRIBAL RESOLUTION 2025- 265

Hunting and fishing within the boundaries of the Spokane Indian Reservation is open only to enrolled members of the Spokane Tribe. As a privilege, spouses of enrolled Spokane Tribal members and first-generation descendants of enrolled Spokane Tribal members are allowed to hunt deer after FIRST obtaining a **Courtesy Permit** and **Hunting Permits** and ONLY during designated seasons. Violations will be subject to confiscation of materials used in an unlawful act and will be prosecuted in Tribal court as a civil or criminal offense. Any question about enforcement should be directed to the Tribal Law Enforcement at (509) 258-4569.

SPOKANE INDIAN RESERVATION 2025 DEER HUNTING SEASON AND REGULATIONS

Spokane Tribal Members (Enrolled)

Mandatory check in for CWD (chronic wasting disease) testing at Department of Natural Resources for all harvested deer (509-626-4405). Failure to report will result in a Resolution Violation (\$300)

White-tail Deer:

White-tail Buck Open July 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025 White-tail Antlerless Open October 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025

Mule Deer: Limit 1 buck/1 antlerless- No more than 2 mule deer per household.

Mule Deer Buck October 1, 2025 through October 14, 2025-Limit ONE buck Mule Deer Antlerless October 1, 2025 through October 14, 2025-Limit ONE antlerless

DO NOT HARVEST COLLARED MULE DEER.

<u>Bag Limit:</u> No more than six (6) deer, either sex, either species, per Tribal member during the 2025 hunting season. No more than six (6) deer per household, total combined with Tribal member, spouse, and descendants in a single household. No more than two (2) deer carcasses in any one person's possession at any one time. Bucks must have visible antlers. Black-tail, including the possibility of White-tail/mule deer hybrid will be considered a mule deer.

SPOKANE INDIAN RESERVATION 2025 BEAR HUNTING SEASONS AND REGULATIONS

Spokane Tribal Members (Enrolled)

Season: Open year-round.

<u>Bag Limit:</u> Total of six (6), either sex, per Tribal member per calendar year. No more than two (2) carcasses in any one person's possession at one time. Pursuing bears, using hound dogs, requires an annual special hound permit. The permit is available through the Tribal Council. Please DO NOT harvest collared bears.

SPOKANE INDIAN RESERVATION 2025 TURKEY HUNTING SEASON AND REGULATIONS

Spokane Tribal Members (Enrolled)

Season: Gobbler and hen open year-round.

SPOKANE TRIBAL RESOLUTIONS 2025-265

Hunting and fishing within the boundaries of the Spokane Indian Reservation is open only to enrolled members of the Spokane Tribe. As a privilege, spouses of enrolled Spokane Tribal Members and first-generation descendants of enrolled Spokane Tribal Members are allowed to hunt deer after first obtaining a **Courtesy Permit** and **Hunting Permit** and ONLY during the designated seasons. Violations will be subject to confiscation of materials used in an unlawful act and will be prosecuted in Tribal court as a civil or criminal offense. Any question about enforcement should be directed to the Tribal Law Enforcement at (509)258-4569.

SPOKANE INDIAN RESERVATION 2025 DEER HUNTING SEASON AND REGULATIONS

First Generation Spokane Descendants and Spouses of Enrolled Spokane Tribal Members

Hunting for all species CLOSED from November 5, 2025 to November 16, 2025.

White-tail Deer:

White-tail Buck: Open October 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025.

Mandatory check in of all deer for CWD (chronic wasting disease) testing at Department of Natural Resources (509-626-4405).

White-tail Antlerless: Open October 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025.

Mandatory check in of all deer for CWD (chronic wasting disease) testing at Department of Natural Resources (509-626-4405).

*Failure to report of harvest will result in loss of Hunting/Fishing Privileges for 1 Season. *

Mule Deer:

Mule Deer: CLOSED FOR 2025 SEASON

Mule Deer Antlerless: CLOSED FOR 2025 SEASON

<u>Bag Limit:</u> No more than two (2) deer only one (1) of which may be antlerless, per descendant/spouse of Spokane Tribal Member during the 2025 hunting season. No more than six (6) deer per household, total combined with Tribal member, spouse, and descendants in a single household. Bucks must have visible antlers. Black-tail, including the possibility of White-tail/mule deer hybrid will be considered a mule deer.

<u>Descendants and Spouses:</u> You must first obtain your Courtesy Permit and up to two (2) Hunting Tags (with harvest report cards) from Tribal Headquarters before hunting (please see the Enrollment Officer). Each deer harvested must be tagged immediately and a harvest report card must be returned within ten (10) days of harvest to the Enrollment Office. All tags and report cards must be turned back in whether you're successful or not no later than <u>JANUARY 3, 2025</u>. Failure to comply will result in the loss of hunting privileges and require a <u>\$100.00</u> reinstatement fee by Tribal Resolution 2006-277, if the fee is not paid within three years there will be a loss of privileges for 10 years.

Season: Open January 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025.

<u>Bag Limit:</u> Total of six (6), either sex, per descendant or spouse per calendar year. No more than two (2) carcasses in any one person's possession at one time.

All bears must be physically checked in at Department of Natural Resources within 72 hours of harvest.

SPOKANE INDIAN RESERVATION 2025 TURKEY HUNTING SEASON AND REGULATIONS

First Generation Spokane Descendants and Spouses of Enrolled Spokane Tribal Members Hunting for all species closed from November 5, 2025 through November 16, 2025

Season: Gobbler and hen open January 1, 2025 through October 31, 2025.

SPOKANE INDIAN RESERVATION 2025 ELK HUNTING SEASONS AND REGULATIONS

GENERAL ELK SEASON 2025: November 5- November 16, 2025

Non-Permit Holders- Season November 5, 2025 through November 16, 2025

Any Bull (North ½) Hunt Area: NORTH of the highway from Little Falls west to Wellpinit west to Peters

Road west to highway 25 South.

Senior 65 and above Antlerless Permits: Season November 5, 2025 through November 16, 2025

Hunt Area: The Senior antlerless elk permit area is within the exterior boundaries of the Spokane Indian Reservation.

Special Spike Only Bull Permits (South ½): Season November 5, 2025 through November 16, 2025 30-Permits, permit valid ONLY in the south half area.

Hunt area: The spike only <u>bull elk permit</u> area includes South of the highway from Little Falls west to Wellpinit

west to Peters Road west to highway 25 South.

Special Antlerless Permits: Season November 5, 2025 through November 16, 2025

Hunt area: The <u>cow elk permit</u> area is within the exterior boundaries of the Spokane Indian Reservation.

Archery Either Sex Permits (North ½): Season September 23, 2025 through September 30, 2025

Hunt Area: The <u>archery either sex permit</u> area includes north of the highway from Little Falls west to Wellpinit West to Peters Road west to Highway 25 South.

Muzzleloader Either Sex Permits (North 1/2): Season October 1, 2025 through October 8, 2025

Hunt Area: The <u>muzzleloader either sex permit</u> area includes north of the highway from Little Falls west to Wellpinit west to Peters Road west to Highway 25 South.




Figure 2. Map designating the North and South hunting area boundaries.

For map designating the North and South hunting area boundaries see Figure 2 on following page.

Permits for approved Spouses and Descendants to accompany a Tribal hunter must be approved no later than November 4th, 2025

Eligibility: Enrolled Spokane members only.

Regulations:

- 1. Application period for permit sign-up will be from: June 2, 2025 to July 31, 2025 STOI Admin Building Monday-Friday 8-4pm. Applicants can only sign-up once for each category.
- 2. Drawing will be held on August 6, 2025 at the Department of Natural Resources
- **3.** Drawing is open to enrolled Spokane Tribal members who are 16 years of age and older on July 31, 2025, or any enrolled youth who has successfully completed a Hunters Safety Course prior to the date of the drawing. Proof of Hunters Safety must be provided to the Wildlife Committee before July 31, 2025.
- 4. Two (2) Special Elk Permit per household.
- 5. One (1) elk per Tribal member, per calendar year. Applicants awarded a 2025 special antlerless elk permit are able to ONLY hunt antlerless elk. UNLESS, they choose to forfeit their special permit. Please DO NOT HARVEST COLLARED ELK
- 6. Special Permits: 229 elk permits (40 senior antlerless, 30 South Half Spike Only, 150 antlerless, 1 "Golden Tag", 4 muzzleloader either sex, and 4 archery either sex) will be determined by special drawing.
- 7. Special permits will be considered forfeited if the chosen applicant delivers a written statement to the Wildlife Committee Chairman, prior to the start of the season associated with the forfeited permit.
- 8. Two (2) year moratoriums for permit winners whether successful at filling permits or not. This includes each category (Spike elk, Muzzleloader and Archery Tags) and also applies to future categories if established.

SPOKANE INDIAN RESERVATION 2025 ELK HUNTING SEASONS AND REGULATIONS


GENERAL ELK SEASON 2025: November 5-November 16, 2025

Eligibility: Enrolled Spokane members only.

Regulations Continued:

- 9. Designated hunters will be allowed for seniors or disabled individuals (65 years and older, or disabled with doctor documentation), if they are special permit holders, they are eligible for the designated hunter program in 2025. Designated hunters must be identified prior to the start of the general elk hunt. Only one designated hunter can be named, and the named designated hunter must be an enrolled Tribal member. Designated hunter permits have an antler restriction of SPIKE ONLY (North half Spike or South half special Spike tag). The designated hunter for an elder with a Senior Antlerless Tag or General Antlerless Elk Tag, may ONLY harvest cows (antlerless elk) for that tag holders. Individuals may only act as a designated hunter for one individual. Designated hunter permits are non-transferable. A formal designated hunter policy is available at the Department of Natural Resources front desk, which must be filled out by November 4 at 4 p.m. (No exceptions).
- 10. Caliber restriction: Firearms with a caliber of less than .243 will not be allowed.
- 11. Vehicle travel is permitted on <u>main roads ONLY</u>, <u>including ATV's</u>, <u>unless retrieving game</u>. (Sect. 15-6.01)
- 12. <u>All harvested elk</u> must be checked in within 24 hours to one of the two (2) designated check stations for CWD. One at the <u>Department of Natural Resources (Wellpinit: 6:30-6)</u>, and the second at <u>Anderson field station (West-End: 7-5:30)</u>. Failure to do so will result in a <u>Resolution Violation</u> and a fine of \$300.
- 13. Bulls must have visible antlers. Spikes must have at least one (1) visible antler with no branches originating more than 4 inches from where the antler attaches the head. An elk that is a 1x2 is a legal spike, figure 1.
- **14.** Either sex permit holders are allowed to harvest one animal either a bull or a cow during the designated season.
- 15. Senior special permits are open to enrolled Tribal members 65 years of age or older.
- 16. Proficiency test for muzzleloader and archery special permits will be held on **June 14th** at 8 am-12pm at the Gun range. Individuals will not be eligible for muzzleloader or archery special permits unless they have successfully passed one of the aforementioned proficiency tests. In 2026, everyone will be required to requalify to be eligible in 2026 for archery and muzzleloader tags.
- 17. Archery restriction: Crossbow use is not allowed.
- 18. Archery and muzzleloader special permit holders are <u>not eligible</u> to hunt elk during the general elk hunt.
- 19. The woods are **CLOSED** to **ALL NON-TRIBAL MEMBERS** during the general elk hunt. The allowable exemptions are as follows; permit must be completed by November 4th, 2025:
 - 17 & under first generation descendants who are accompanied by their Spokane Tribal member parent or guardian. They are not permitted to carry or discharge a firearm.
 - Legally married spouses may be allowed to ride and assist with gutting/loading a harvested animal, upon Council approval. For a non-member spouse to be considered, they must have a valid courtesy permit through the Spokane Tribal Enrollment Office and be in good standing.

Elk Hoof Disease in Washington State (TAHD)



- The disease appears to be highly infectious among elk, however there is no evidence that it affects humans. TAHD can affect hooves of any elk, young or old, male or female.
- Disease is limited to animals' hooves and does not affect their meat or organs.
- Currently there is no vaccine or proven options of treatment.
- Most cases in Washington have been primarily reported in Southwest corner of the state.
- Please report any observations of healthy elk limping or any elk harvested or found dead with hoof abnormalities.

SPOKANE INDIAN RESERVATIONS 2025 MOOSE HUNTING SEASONS AND REGULATIONS

Eligibility: Enrolled Spokane Tribal members only.

Regulations:

- 1. Application period for permit sign-up will be from: June 1, 2025 to July 31, 2025.
- 2. Drawing will be held on August 6, 2025 at Department of Natural Resources.
- **3.** Drawing is open to enrolled Spokane Tribal members who are 16 years of age and older on July 31, 2025 or any enrolled youth who has successfully completed a Hunters Safety Course prior to the date of the drawing.
- **4.** One (1) special moose permit per household.
- **5.** Special Permits: **6 moose permits** (2 Reservation wide bulls, **4** Sand Creek Bulls) will be determined by special drawing.
- **6.** Bulls must have visible antlers.
- 7. Special permits will be considered forfeited if the chosen applicant delivers a written statement to the Wildlife Committee Chairman, prior to the start of the season associated with the forfeited permit
- 8. Special permit season will be from October 1, 2025 to December 31, 2025.
- **9.** Applicants can apply by signing-up at Spokane Tribal Admin Building. Applicants can only sign-up once for each category.
- **10.** Five (5) year moratoriums for permit winners whether successful at filling permits or not. This includes each category (bull, antlerless, etc.) and also applies to future categories if established.
- **11.** Harvested moose must be reported to Tribal Park Rangers and/or Law Enforcement Officers to validate the harvest site within 24 hours.
- **12.** All moose harvested must be checked in at Department of Natural Resources within 72 Hours for CWD.

Bull Moose Permits: Season October 1, 2025 to December 31, 2025

Hunt Area: The bull moose permit area is within the boundaries of the Spokane Indian Reservation.

Sand Creek Bull Special Area Moose Permits: Season October 1, 2025 to December 31, 2025




Figure 3 Sandcreek Moose Special Hunt Area

Hunt Area: The Sand Creek special area moose permit area starts at the North Boundary (48th Parallel) commences south on Orzada Mine Road (West Boundary) to the intersection of Upper Sand Creek (East Boundary) then north to the North Boundary (48th Parallel) then west to the point of origin (requests for maps of the Sand Creek special area should be made to the Wildlife Program. See Figure 3.

• Shooting out of the designated hunt area will result in forfeiture of animal and tag.

CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE (CWD)

What is it?

- CWD is a fatal central nervous system disease found in cervids: Elk, Deer and Moose.
- It causes proteins to misfold and accumulate in the central nervous system
- Transmitted through direct animal-to-animal contact or indirectly through saliva, urine, feces, blood, or carcass of infected animals
- Recently found in Spokane county, it was the first confirmed case in Washington State.
- It has never been documented to transmit to humans however due to the classification of this disease it does have potential to.

- Signs of CWD in Cervids

 ✓ Loss of body condition or emaciation (wasting).

 ✓ Change in behavior such as loss of for a flavor.
- Change in behavior such as loss of fear of humans.
- Loss of bodily control or movements.
- ✓ Excessive drooling and salivating.

What are the Impacts?

- Healthy cervid populations are of the upmost importance to the STOI, established CWD on reservation could significantly reduce cervid populations.
- CWD can spread through all cervid populations.
- All infected animals die from the disease.
- There are currently no vaccines or treatments available.
- Hunting traditions are important to the STOI membership, as is monitoring for the disease.
- Monitoring for the disease will allow the Program to determine the prevalence rate in our population and appropriate management tools to minimize impacts.

What should you do?

- MANDATORY: Get your harvested animal tested for CWD at DNR or by leaving the head in a drop off bin.
- ✓ Should you harvest or observe an animal you suspect of having CWD, contact the STOI Wildlife program or Tribal Rangers IMMEDIATELY.
- ✓ It is recommended that an animal be tested prior to consumption pending a negative test result.
- ✓ The CDC currently recommends not to consume meat from a CWD positive animal.
- ✓ Use protective measures when field dressing your animal, dispose of head, spinal cord, and bones in designated disposal sites.

CWD RELATED RESOLUTIONS

Resolution 2024-415: Restrictions on importing and possessing game meat harvested off the reservation due to chronic wasting disease

- All wild game harvested or salvaged outside of the exterior boundaries of the reservation may only be
 imported or possessed if the meat has been deboned in the state, province, or area it was
 harvested/salvaged and is imported as boned-out meat. No person may bring or import the bones, spinal
 cord tissue, and/or brain matter of wild game meat harvested/salvaged beyond the exterior boundaries of
 the reservation onto the reservation.
- Skulls and antlers, antlers attached to the skull plate or whole skull may only be imported when all soft tissue and brain matter are removed from the skull and/or brain cavity.
- Washington State already enacted a similar law of game transport, for more information see WAC 220-413-030

Resolution 2024-416: Bait ban on the Spokane Indian Reservation due to Chronic Wasting Disease

- It shall be unlawful to bait any wildlife with salt, grain, fruit, hay, or other food-based attractant that could serve as a lure or attractant for deer, elk, and moose.
- It shall be unlawful to use artificial or synthetic scent attractants or other bodily fluid-based scent attractants.
- The following are not valid defenses or exceptions to the ban on baiting wildlife:
 - o Accidental or unintentional spills of bait or attractants
 - Dumping of bait or attractants
 - Storage of feed, bait or attractants
 - O Storage of other agricultural produce including hay or minerals which may attract deer, elk, or

GRAY WOLF

Eligibility: Open to enrolled Spokane Tribal Members only

Season: Open year-round, Within the Boundaries of the Spokane Indian Reservation

Quota: The 2025 gray wolf hunting season will close once ten (10) individuals are harvested.

Regulations:

- 1. Trapping and/or snaring will be allowed by special permit only. See additional requirements on the next page.
- 2. Trapping and/or snaring season open October 1, 2025-February 28, 2026 with valid trapping permit.
- **3.** Tracking dogs will **not** be allowed.
- **4.** Individuals outfitted with radio-collars are **not** to be harvested.
- **5.** Radio-telemetry may **not** be used to assist in gray wolf harvest.
- 6. All gray wolf kills are to be reported IMMEDIATELY upon recovery of animal, to either the Department of Natural Resources Biologists (Wellpinit) or the Public Safety Building Law Enforcement/Park Ranger (Wellpinit) and physically checked with the Wildlife Program within 72 hours for data collection. Failure to do so will result in a Resolution Violation and a fine of \$300.
- 7. Hunters are not required to save the meat from harvested gray wolves.
- **8.** Unintentional takes must be turned into the Spokane Tribe of Indians Department of Natural Resource immediately.

The above seasons and regulations are subject to change at the discretion of the Spokane Tribal Business Council.

SPOKANE TRIBE OF INDIANS 2025 TRAPPING SEASONS AND REGULATIONS

Spokane Tribal Resolution 2025-265

Hunting and fishing within the boundaries of the Spokane Indian Reservation is open only to enrolled members of the Spokane Tribe. Violations will be subject to confiscation of materials used in an unlawful act and will be prosecuted in Tribal court as a civil or criminal offense. Any question about enforcement or regulations should be directed to the Tribal Law Enforcement at (509) 258-4569 or Derek Abrahamson – Wildlife Bio – 626-4405.

General Trapping

- 1. Trapping and snaring permits must be obtained on an annual basis. All permits expire on March 1 of each
- 2. All traps and snares must have permit holders name and number etched or affixed to them.
- 3. All cable snares must have a 6-to-7-inch deer stop and 450lb breakaway.
- 4. No traps can be set closer than 50 feet from exposed bait or carcasses.
 - Cervid carcasses used as bait must have a no detection CWD test result to prevent environmental contamination
- 5. It is a violation to destroy, disturb, or remove trapped wildlife belonging to others.
- 6. Traps and snares shall be checked at least every 48 hours.
- 7. Traps must be set a minimum of 150 yards away from a residence.

Wolf Trapping

Must follow General Trapping guidelines in addition to the following:

- 1. Must pass an approved Trapping Proficiency class prior to applying for wolf trapping permit.
- 2. All leg hold traps must have padded jaws to allow for release of collared wolves with minimal injuries.
- 3. All trap jaws must be no less than 7 1/4" when trap is open.
- 4. All snare cables must be 3/32" or larger with a 6-to-7-inch deer stop and 450lb breakaway.
- 5. All trapping and snaring locations must be reported to the Wildlife Program with reasonable specificity.
- 6. The Wildlife Program will be notified immediately if a collared wolf is captured so that it can be released if possible.
- 7. If a collared wolf is killed, the collar must be returned to the Wildlife Program.
- 8. All gray wolf kills are to be reported **IMMEDIATELY upon recovery of animal**, to either the Department of Natural Resources Biologists (Wellpinit) or the Public Safety Building Law Enforcement/Park Ranger (Wellpinit) and physically checked with the Wildlife Program within 72 hours for data collection.
